Project Restore**

**Residence A**

Project Restore, a nonprofit organization committed to preserving the city’s historical landmarks, commemorates Residence A’s 100th anniversary with full completion of its exterior and phase one of the restoration plan. It is working closely with city partners to ensure that the second phase of the project, focused on its interior, is fully completed.

Residence A is a historic civic treasure designed by world-renowned architect Frank Lloyd Wright, and part of a National Historic Landmark and UNESCO World Heritage Site at Barnsdall Art Park. As one of only two Frank Lloyd Wright structures in Southern California open for public viewing, the other being Hollyhock House located in the same Barnsdall Art Park complex, upon its completion, Residence A promises to be an iconic architectural piece that Angelenos can be proud of.

A beautifully designed cantilevered living room balcony featuring ornate patterns of art stone unique to this house in California, exquisite wooden moldings and floors, and recreated furniture from the turn of the last century – all meticulously restored to the site – are among the many details that visitors will observe and enjoy at Residence A, once the work is completed and the building is open to the public.

In addition to exterior and interior finishes, Residence A has received seismic retrofitting and electrical upgrades.
